

10 Mistakes Parents Make Teaching Learner Drivers

Waiting to teach learners until they get their learners permit

You've missed thousands of opportunities to explain how and why you made important safety decisions. "I'm travelling is this lane because..."

Modelling poor behaviour since infancy

If you speed, drink & drive, use a smart-phone, drive long distances without a break, park in No Standing zones or get angry at other drivers, you're setting the example your children are very likely to follow.

Believing a driving instructor can correct 16 years of previous learning with a few lessons

Expecting a paid driving instructor to create a well formed adolescent driver, particularly with regard to beliefs, values and attitudes in a handful of lessons is an unrealistic expectation.

Expecting too much too soon

Driving is a very complex task that should be broken down into 'chunks'. Learners should become competent at basic tasks like starting and stopping, before moving on to leaving/returning to the kerb etc.

Forgetting what it's like to be a learner

Most drivers forget what it's like to be a learner. Try taking violin lessons before you start to teach your children to drive. You'll soon see how it feels to struggle with the basics.

Not doing your homework

Have you learnt what and how to teach before you start? Try to remember to ask, more than you tell.

Cheating in the log book

Are you making false statements in the log book? What are you teaching your child about following the rules?

Getting angry

Learners don't make mistakes on purpose. Getting angry at the learner (or other drivers) doesn't help.

Not a taxi service

Don't use a learner driver as a taxi service. Use time behind the wheel with a strong sense of purpose.

Failing to follow up
